THE PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT TO THE FRIENDS - 1988-1989

Dear Friends,

As I write this report, I'm sitting on our deck overlooking the Straits of Juan de Fuca. The peaks of the Olympic Mountains are still glistening with snow; the placid blue of the water is just now being dimpled by the pod of orca whales which passes along the shore each morning (17 of them today). Tubs of bright petunias and lobelia surround my writing table, giving depth to this sun-drenched vista.

While it must be apparent that I'm taking joy in our new environs, it is with great regret that I give up my active association with the Friends of the Farm and Garden. The three years of my board membership have been filled with the pleasure of growing -- the lovely and always miraculous growth of produce and beauty from the soil, and the growth of individuals and relationships among all of you who make such productivity possible.


May the sun shine on each of your dreams.




A Field Trip to Three Local Gardens

On Saturday, August 19, the Friends cordially invite you to share the pleasure of visiting three gardens of Friends in Santa Cruz.

Locations will be marked with balloons. One note: to reach Marshall's place, turn left just beyond Salz Leathers and United Parcel. Stop at the house on the left <u>immediately</u> after the underpass. Marshall's unique raised beds form a circular vegetable, herb and flower garden with spiral pathways leading to a center focus. We are leaving you plenty of morning time if you wish to walk down the road to former Apprentice Fran Coor's Farm, once shared with Dennis Tamura. If you missed the May field trip to the Blue Heron Farm in Corralitos, this is your chance to see another organic commercial garden which has profited from U.C.S.C. Farm and Garden training.

The afternoon gardens are unusually colorful, combining some perennials with massed annuals. Gerry Bowden is experimenting with some unusual new plants and thriving dwarf fruit trees in a well planned area behind the Bowden house. The Summers' garden illustrates how to handle a corner lot with striking plantings on three sides. It surpasses in brilliance all of the garden catalogues, is a delight to passers-by and an unholy temptation as well. You will wish you could imitate the decking and containers which Dav built. Wendy and Dav provide meticulous maintenance even though both have full work schedules.
